RESOURCES FOR SURVIVORS

DISASTER DISTRESS HOTLINE

The Disaster Distress Helpline, 1-800-985-5990, is a 24/7, 365-day-a-year, national hotline dedicated to providing immediate crisis counseling for people who are experiencing emotional distress related to any natural or human-caused disaster. This toll-free, multilingual, and confidential crisis support service is available to all residents in the United States and its territories. Stress, anxiety, and other depression-like symptoms are common reactions after a disaster.

FEMA REGISTRATION FOR ALL IMPACTED

The current federal disaster declaration has approved assistance for individuals and households in the following 8 counties (more counties may be added as damage assessments continue): Caldwell, Fulton, Graves, Hopkins, Marshall, Muhlenberg, Taylor, and Warren. Various kinds of assistance are available, with varied eligibility requirements, for immediate needs as well as damage to homes/personal property.

It is important for folks who had impacts from the storm to register with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), even if they don't think they will qualify for assistance. A FEMA application (even a denial) is often the first step for accessing other resources and programs, including low-interest disaster loans for households through the Small Business Administration (SBA).

Apply by phone at 800-621-3362, online at <u>www.disasterassistance.gov</u>, or via the FEMA App. In-person registration is also available in select locations (more sites to be added):

- Mobile Registration Centers open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Central daily.
 - Dawson Springs: First Baptist Church--960 Industrial Park Rd, Dawson Springs, KY 42408
 - Mayfield: The old Walmart location, Mayfield Plaza, 1102 Paris Rd, Mayfield, KY 42066

The SBA now has a Business Recovery Center open at the Joe Creason Community Center (1600 Park Ave. in Benton). The facility will provide businesses impacted by the storms with help in applying for disaster loans from the federal government. Hours are 9 a.m.-6 p.m. Central Monday-Friday and 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Central Saturday.

HOW CAN I HELP?

STAY, PRAY, GIVE, ORGANIZE, AND SPREAD THE WORD

As Week of Compassion often says, right now the best way to help is to Stay, Pray, and Give:

- Stay home until the local communities have a chance to assess their needs and organize ways for volunteers to be helpful. Week of Compassion will help the West Area communicate opportunities to work with partners and our local congregations. Individuals interested in volunteering can also register with <u>Serve Kentucky</u> through Kentucky Emergency Management (<u>https://survey123.arcgis.com/share/02e24e0e3ddd4d158a21aaf9a0973384</u>). Remember, the need for volunteers will continue long after the news attention fades—rebuilding is likely to take years, and volunteers are a critical part of that process!
- **Pray** for our eight directly-impacted church communities—Benton, Bowling Green, Dawson Springs, Ilsley, Mayfield (First and Second), Pembroke, and Princeton, as well as the surrounding counties still restoring basic utilities. Pray for our neighbors and the many responders who are working tirelessly in response to this disaster.
- Give. The greatest need is for money. It is the most efficient and flexible donation we can make, that reduces waste and hassle, as communities and partners can use the money when they need it for exactly what they need, leveraging connections to make dollars stretch farther. This recovery will also involve significant rebuild needs, and money is useful now and throughout the whole of recovery. As communities and congregations assess their situations, they will share out information about what material items are needed where. Those needs can shift fairly quickly. We will share that information as it comes available. The Week of Compassion (<u>https://www.weekofcompassion.org/donate.html</u>) and all of our churches in or near impacted communities are receiving financial donations to assist in recovery. - Get Organized. Identify who in your congregation wants to help and what skills they have, as well as what other resources (financial, material, and human) you have available. Do you have folks who are able to tarp roofs or help clean up debris? Do you have the ability to transport goods? Do your people's gifts and skills lie more in communication and fundraising? The more prepared you are, the more quickly you will be able to mobilize when needs arise. We will email pastors about known volunteer opportunities as spots are organized. Some will be for certain specialized skills; some will be for whole groups; and some will be in your own community as impacted families relocate or arriving utility and disaster crews need hospitality.

TREASURER'S REPORT

NOVEMBER HIGHLIGHTS

West Area:

We had enough Congregational support in November to put us over budget for the year. The \$4,277 we received put us at a year-to-date total of \$64,544 or 101% of our annual budget. We also received DMF support of \$7,500 and our annual budgeted draw from Endowment Funds totaling \$11,844. We had total expenses of \$4,820, giving us a positive cash flow for the month of \$19,226. We ended the month with a cash balance of \$106,015.

Camp Kum-Ba-Ya:

So far this year we have had receipts of \$82,374 with expenses of \$64,967 giving us a positive cash flow of \$17,407. The ending cash balance was \$25,625. The restricted fund balance was \$19,928 which will be used mainly on Camp upgrades.
